Esther 2:21-3:6

^{2:21} During the time Mordecai was sitting at the king's gate, two of the king's eunuchs, Bigthana and Teresh - two of the king's officers who guarded the doorway, became angry and conspired to assassinate King Xerxes. ²² But Mordecai heard about the plot and told Queen Esther, who in turn reported it to the king, giving credit to Mordecai.. ²³ And when the report was investigated, and found to be true, the two officials were hanged on a gallows. All this was recorded in The Book of the annals in the presence of the king.

^{3:1} After these events, King Xerxes honoured Haman son of Hammedatha, the Agagite, elevating him and giving him a seat of honour higher than that of all the other nobles. ² All the royal officials at the king's gate knelt down and paid honour to Haman, for the king had commanded this concerning him. But Mordecai would not kneel down or pay him honour.

³ Then the royal officials at the king's gate asked Mordecai, "Why do you disobey the king's command?" ⁴ Day after day they spoke to him but he refused to comply. Therefore they told Haman about it to see whether Mordecai's behaviour would be tolerated, for he had told them he was a Jew.

⁵ When Haman saw that Mordecai would not kneel down or pay him honour, he was enraged. ⁶ Yet having learned who Mordecai's people were, he scorned the idea of killing only Mordecai. Instead Haman looked for a way to destroy all Mordecai's people, the Jews, throughout the whole kingdom of Xerxes.

Read Esther 2:21-3:6

1. How well do you think this passage relates to the present day? Explain.

- 2. Ravi Zacharias once said, "When you violate God's law there is a moment of judgement that comes, and part of that judgement is suffering, pain, grief. He goes on to explain that this often comes in the form of disease, an invading army, and the elements. What do you think of this statement?
- 3. Dealing with the problem of sin is the greatest need in the world. Why do you think mankind minimises sin?
- 4. It seems that Mordecai was one of the officials that "sat at the King's gate". He therefore probably saw Bigthana and Teresh most days in his life. In reporting their conspiracy to the king, what kind of risk do you think he was taking?
- 5. There is often a reluctance to 'get involved' in someone else's troubles. Especially if our involvement is going to cost us something (that could be: time, reputation, financially, friendships etc). Why do you think this is?
